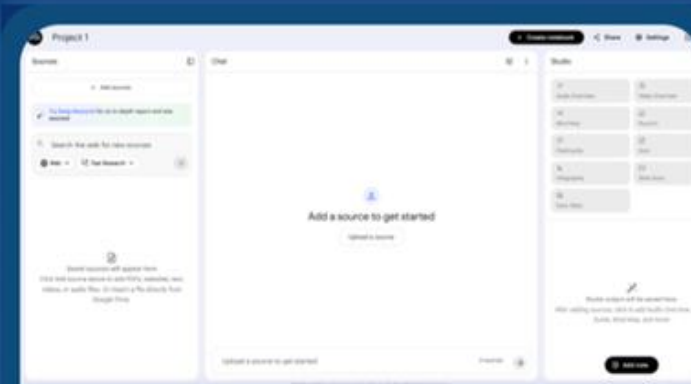

Quick Tips for Better Prompts

- 1. Be specific** – say exactly what you need
- 2. Add context** – age, group, setting
- 3. Define format** – list, plan, steps, table
- 4. Use a role** – “Act as a youth worker...”
- 5. Keep it practical** – ask for real, usable outputs
- 6. Break tasks down** – one thing at a time
- 7. Ask for multiple ideas** – not just one
- 8. Refine answers** – improve with follow-up prompts

Workshop plan ✓

Act as a youth worker. Create a 60-minute workshop on inclusion for 15-year-olds. Include timing, materials, and step-by-step instructions.

Icebreakers ✓

Give me 5 icebreaker activities for a group of 20 young people aged 14–16. Focus on teamwork and communication.

Discussion questions ✓

Create 10 reflection questions for young people about social media and mental health.

Adaptation ✓

Adapt this activity for participants with learning difficulties and low attention span.

2. Information support

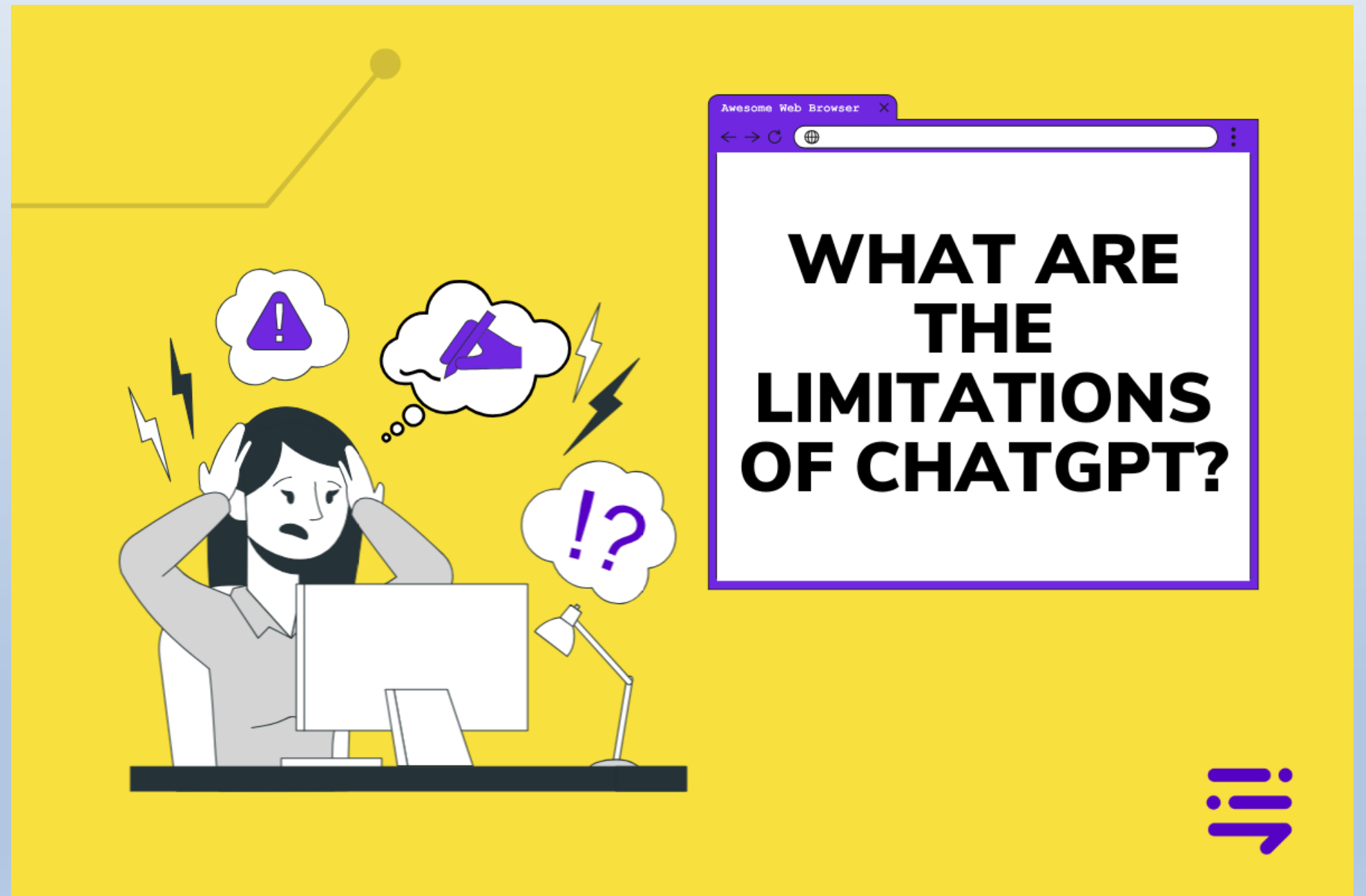
